# WHAT IS THE LEVEL OF FORCE USED BY THE SHARONVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT?

The Sharonville Police Department has long been committed to providing the most professional police services possible. As our mission statement states, we pride ourselves in serving the community with purpose.

Given the recent attention regarding police use of force and the important discussions taking place nationally, we thought we would once again share our Use of Force data, to include the 2019 update. In years 2016 through 2019, the Sharonville Police Department arrested 2,375 individuals. Of the 2,375

arrests, there have been a total of 103 that involved use of force, or 4.3% of those arrested. There have been no complaints against a Sharonville Police Officer for excessive use of force.

The Sharonville Police Department is certified with the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board as well as being a Lexipol agency.

# SHARONVILLE POLICE RESPONSE TO COVID-19 PANDEMIC

While the COVID-19 pandemic has affected all service industries, the City of Sharonville has worked hard to shift the way we operate to mitigate those effects on the service we provide to our community. Within the police department, a multi-phase emergency preparedness plan is in place ahead of time for such major events like a public health emergency.


Following the direction and guidance of the CDC as well as state and local health directors, our agency was quick to establish preventive measures to protect our employees from exposure. Limited reporting procedures were implemented such as open-air and telephone reporting in order to limit personal contact and possible exposure for our citizens and officers.

Given the uncertainty of when Ohio would hit its peak number of cases and how hard the virus would hit our department members specifically, in April our agency implemented an alternative scheduling plan to minimize exposure risk. Sharonville officers were temporarily moved out of specialized positions so that we could maximize our resources to our most critical duties on patrol. Officers were moved from 8.5hr shifts to 12hr shifts in order to provide our community with adequate coverage while allowing for up to 1/3 of our department to be quarantined or isolated for 2 weeks should the need arise.

Atop regular stringent cleaning practices, Enviro-Master Services was contracted for an additional weekly Virus Vaporizing Service. Our building and all cruisers were treated with an electrostatic disinfectant application, containing active ingredients that are EPA-registered to kill Coronaviruses along with many other organisms like flu germs, Hepatitis, Norovirus and MRSA.

By June, as our state moved to reopen responsibly, our officers were back to normal scheduling but still operating on somewhat limited reporting procedure and maintaining compliance of city-wide policies for personal protection. Although police officers are not mandated to wear masks while performing their official duties, our officers are still avoiding congregating within the department's common areas, maintaining physical distancing and checking temperatures at the start of shifts.

The graphic below indicates the decrease in our calls for service related to the pandemic, but also indicates we are nearly back on track as we head into (what have previously been) our busiest months of the year. Throughout the pandemic, our primary concern has been maintaining the health and safety of our staff and community so that we are able to maintain our high standard of service.





# FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Fire Prevention Week 2020 begins Sunday, October 4th. In lieu of a fire station open house, here are fire safety tips from our department.

# **Check Smoke Detectors & Fire Extinguishers**

- Change batteries in smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors
- Verify each month that smoke detectors are in working order
- Verify that all fire extinguishers are fully charged and in working order
- Make sure that there is a sufficient quantity of smoke detectors in your home
- Make sure everyone in your family knows how to use a fire extinguisher

# **Make Sure All Heating Sources Work Properly**

- No matter what type of device you use to heat your home, make sure your heating devices and/or systems are in good working
- Verify that everything you need to keep your home warm throughout fall and winter is in good working order
- Inspect chimney for buildup, cracks and gaps that can cause a fire
- Inspect furnace for proper operation

# Kitchen Fire Safety

- Don't leave cooking food unattended on the stove
- Keep everything that might be flammable away from your stove, including off of the stove top





# **Space Heater Safety Tips**

- Make sure that any space heaters are surrounded by at least three feet of empty space
- Never place clothing or any other objects on a space heater to dry
- Do not place space heaters near furniture or draperies

- Turn space heaters off when you leave the house or go to bed
- Avoid storing any combustible items near heaters

# Family Fire Safety Tips

- Teach your kids how to respond in the event of a fire
- Make sure young children know how to dial 911
- Establish and practice a fire escape plan with your family that includes a designated meeting area outside the home
- Practice stop, drop and roll with your children so they learn how to escape beneath a fire
- Teach everyone in your family multiple ways to escape from every room in the event of a fire
- Do not place lit candles where they can be reached by children
- Never leave burning candles unattended
- Do not leave candles burning when you go to sleep
- Make sure all flammable substances are properly stored in safe containers and out of reach of children

# **Outdoor Fire Safety**

- Outdoor burning of brush and leaves is not permitted
- Outdoor bonfires or recreational fires require a permit
- Small outdoor fires are only approved when they are in a UL approved outdoor fireplace.

# DID YOU FORGET TO FILE YOUR SHARONVILLE TAX RETURN?

- Please file as soon as possible.
- You can still e-file at www.municonnect.com/sharonville, mail the return or stop by our office for assistance.
- Continuing to delay filing will only increase possible penalties.

# **NEED MORE TIME TO FILE?**

All local tax returns with a Federal extension are due by October 15, 2020. A copy of the extension should accompany the filed tax return. Extensions only extend the time allowed to file a tax return, they do not extend the payment due dates.

# How Do I Pay My Tax?

- If you E-file, payment may be made by ACH or credit card within the website as you complete your return.
- Check or money order payments may be mailed in and should be made payable to "City of Sharonville Tax".
- Payments by check, money order, cash or credit card are accepted at the tax office.
- Payments may also be made through Official Payments either online or by phone at 1-800-487-4567.
- Bi-monthly invoices are sent for all tax balances. If you have questions regarding any balance due please call.

**Note:** All credit card payments will incur a fee by the processing company.

# RECEIVED A LETTER ASKING FOR MORE DOCUMENTS?

If we didn't receive all the required documents (W-2s or federal forms), a request is sent to verify the data on your tax return. Please send the requested information in as soon as possible so your tax return can be completed. Failure to send in these documents can result in lost credits, late filing fees, or additional charges if a payment is subsequently due.

# AM I REQUIRED TO PAY ESTIMATED TAXES?

All individuals and businesses that reasonably expect to owe \$200 or more due to taxable income, after subtracting credits from withholding by an employer, are required to estimate and pay the tax during the year the income is earned.

If you owe less than \$200 but still wish to make estimated payments, you may do so at any time. You may increase or decrease your estimated taxes at any time by notifying us in writing.

2nd quarter payments were due by July 15, 2020. Invoices will be sent twice this year for the 3rd and 4th quarter payments which are due on September 15, 2020 and January 15, 2021. Failure to pay at least 90% of your 2020 tax liability by January 15, 2021 may result in a 15% penalty.

Refunds are processed in the order received. You should expect a check to arrive within 90 days.

# **PROPERTY TAXES**

The collections of property taxes (residential property or business property) are the responsibility of Hamilton County or Butler County. The City of Sharonville does not receive property tax dollars from city residents or businesses and is proud that a municipal property tax has not been levied in over 30 years. # SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX

The City of Sharonville is located within the Princeton City School District. The code for state income tax form purposes is 3116.

# SEASONAL REMINDERS

### FALL:

- There is no leaf pick up program in the City of Sharonville raking leaves into the street gutters is not permitted.
- Raking leaves into the gutter causes catch basins to back up and flood streets. Rake and bag leaves for pick up and disposal with Rumpke on your trash days. Rumpke has a 10 item limit.
- If you have a storm culvert that runs along your property line or under your driveway, it is the homeowner's responsibility to keep these culverts and the inlets clear of leaves and debris. Clogged culverts affect drainage upstream and flooding on roadways and surrounding areas.



# **TRUCK LOAN PROGRAM**

- Available until October 31st for 2020 for large trash disposal.
- Cost for homeowners is \$50 a night and \$60 for the weekend. For businesses, it is \$90 for nights and weekends.
- Call to schedule a truck.

## Brush and Special Pick-up Service

- Curbside brush and special pickup is a FREE year-round service (unless it is snowing and we are treating the roads) to residents.
- Residents must call by 5:00 p.m. Friday to have their address put on a list for pick up the following week.
- Twigs cannot be picked up. They are yard waste and must be disposed of with your regular garbage pick-up.
- Public Works employees are instructed to spend no more than 15 minutes per stop for the service. Please refer to our website for additional details.

# **ADDITIONAL SERVICES**

Public Works provides a variety of services to keep our streets maintained. Call our office if you see something that needs attention. Services performed include, but not limited to:

- · Removal of dead animals
- · Street sweeping, including sweeping for nails
- Trimming low hanging tree limbs that overhang the streets
- Traffic light repairs
- Street signs, repair and replace as needed
- Street lights, repair and replace as needed



# HAVE YOUR HOLIDAY LIGHTS LOST THEIR TWINKLE?

### WINTER:

- During a snowstorm, do NOT park vehicles on the street. Cars parked on the street create additional obstacles and restrict visibility. Parking your vehicle in your driveway allows for a more complete clearing of your street. Wherever practical, we will attempt to keep the snow build-up to a minimum. We are unable to remove plowed snow from in front of driveways. This is the responsibility of the homeowner. Do not shovel snow into the street
- Older residents and those with health problems are reminded to avoid physical activity associated with shoveling snow.
- Stay at least two car lengths behind a snow plow for every 10 mph you are traveling. Never cut in between a caravan of plows clearing a road.
- Beware of black ice, roads that look wet but actually are glazed with ice. Ramps and bridges freeze first.
- Winter weather brings potholes and other unsafe conditions.
   Please notify Public Works of any curb, street, sidewalk or storm drainage problems in the City. The Public Works Department will attempt to correct the safety problems in a timely manner.

## **SENIOR APARTMENTS**

Located on Greensfelder Lane off of Thornview Drive, Golden View Acres is a 52-unit apartment senior retirement complex.

In order to be an eligible tenant, a person must be at least 57 years of age and a current Sharonville resident for at least one year, or be a parent, grandparent, or sibling of a current Sharonville resident who has resided in the City for one year.

Golden View Acres has first and second floor units and one and two bedroom apartments. Each apartment has an equipped kitchen with stove and refrigerator, gas heat, hot water, and air conditioning. Tenants pay their own utilities except water. There are coin operated laundry facilities in each of the three buildings. When renting an apartment an initial security deposit equaling one month's rent is required. After signing the lease, THE RENT WILL NOT



BE RAISED unless an additional tenant occupies the same apartment or the current tenant moves to another apartment in the complex. At that time, a new rental agreement is required to be signed at the current rate.

To be placed on a WAITING LIST to rent an apartment, a written application must be made and a \$50 fee deposited. This fee is refundable when you rent an apartment or request, in writing, to be removed from the waiting list.


# SHARONVILLE BIKE TRAIL FEASIBILITY STUDY: CONNECTING DOWNTOWN, PEOPLE, AND PARKS


The City of Sharonville was awarded a Community Development Block Grant planning mini-grant in the amount of \$10,000 from Hamilton County Planning + Development to prepare the Sharonville Bike Trail Feasibility Study: Connecting Downtown, People, and Parks. This study will create a conceptual plan to evaluate and determine which trail or trails can be easily, affordably, or successfully implemented for the benefit of Sharonville residents.

This project will expand off Phase II of the City of Sharonville Downtown Loop Streetscape Master Plan (adopted June 2020) which is shown below. The study will help visualize 3 to 5 potential route options through the Sharonville Downtown Loop which could expand or create connections for Sharonville residents to Sharon Creek (located west of the Downtown Loop), Sharon Woods, Sharonville Elementary, or along Creek Road towards Gower Park, the Sharonville Community Center and Sharonville Branch Public Library.

This study will also directly support the Sharonville 2030 Comprehensive Plan Theme #3, to Improve Connectivity throughout the City. The current trail options Hamilton County is considering to evaluate for the City are indicated on the map to the right.

# Home Weatherization and Energy Conservation

Winter Is Coming. Are you a Sharonville resident struggling to pay energy utility bills? You may qualify for free assistance to help you save money.

The application process is simple, but you must meet the minimum qualifications to participate in the program. PWC will need to verify your household information (income, etc.). They can take your information over the phone and mail you the application already

filled out. Just sign it and send in any additional documentation that may be needed to see if you qualify.

# WATERCOURSE MAINTENANCE ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

Properties may be traversed by natural and man-made watercourses such as creeks, streams, ditches and drainage swales. These watercourses may become overgrown and possible obstructions can lead to flooding on adjacent properties. Because these watercourses are located on private property, not public or City owned property, it is the responsibility of the property owner to maintain the watercourse.

City of Sharonville Ordinance No. 521.05 requires that obstructions be removed from water courses. These obstructions may take the form of trash, debris, or loose vegetation that becomes lodged and creates an

obstruction to the natural flow of water through the watercourse.

Property owners are advised to make periodic inspections of watercourses traversing their property and perform regular maintenance to ensure that trash, debris, log jams, etc., do not create obstructions. For questions, call our office.

# SHARONVILLE ZONING CODE UPDATE


The City of Sharonville has finished a twoyear public engagement process to adopt the Sharonville 2030 Comprehensive Plan to define the vision for the City for the next 20+ years. Next, the City will update the zoning code so the rules and regulations that shape the community can support the maintenance and growth the community desires to see. The zoning code affects much of the development that occurs in the City. Zoning regulations influence what businesses are permitted in certain areas of the City. Zoning can also impact the size or type of three-season room a resident can consider installing on their property. Because Zoning plays an important role in shaping development and visual characteristics of the community, the City wants your help!

Over the past two years the City has taken notes during the Sharonville 2030 public engagement process to address zoning concerns. Since April 2020, the City has posted three surveys online on the Sharonville2030.com website and on the City Facebook page to engage members of the public on zoning code updates. Public input has been gathered from Sharonville 2030

Comprehensive Plan and online surveys to help shape the first draft of the Zoning Code update. See the map below.

Leading up to the Zoning Code Update adoption, potentially in mid-2021, the plan will remain publicly made available for review and comment.







# DORA has the Green Light for Downtown Sharonville!



WHAT IS A DORA? DORA stands for "Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area" – it allows those over 21 years of age to purchase alcoholic beverages from a participating establishment within the area and carry the beverage in a DORA-plastic cup within the DORA boundaries (see above map).

WHEN WILL THE DORA BEGIN? We are still working on the details with the businesses within the DORA, but it should begin in the near future. Please follow our website – www.sharonvilleohio.org – and Facebook page for details.

WILL THE HOURS OF THE DORA BE LIMITED? Yes, the DORA hours will be Monday through Thursday from 5:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., Friday from 5:00 p.m. to midnight, Saturday from noon to midnight, and Sunday from noon to 9:00 p.m. Special hours of DORA operation will be allowed as designated in advance by the Mayor, for holidays or special events, with the consent of City Council.

WHO WILL BE SELLING DORA BEVERAGES? COVID is complicating things a bit. There are 6 entities that are eligible to participate per State law. As of the date of this publication, the VFW, LaRosa's, Alreddy Café, and Al's Bar plan on participating. The Blue Goose, primarily given COVID concerns, is considering being a participant, but will be taking a "wait and see" approach. The Chinese Imperial Inn has decided not to participate at this time.

# Where will people be able to walk with DORA beverages?

Patrons can only carry DORA beverages in the defined area. Retail and private establishments may allow DORA beverages in their businesses or they may opt to not allow them. Establishments within the DORA will have their own policy, which will be visible with signage.

WILL PEOPLE BE ABLE TO TAKE A DORA BEVERAGE INTO ANOTHER DORA-AUTHORIZED ESTABLISHMENT? No. Per law, once a DORA beverage has left an establishment, it must be consumed before entering another DORA-authorized establishment. Some DORAs allow empty cups to be taken into establishments for another beverage, but with COVID restrictions, this will likely not be the case upon implementation.

WILL PEOPLE BE ABLE TO POUR THEIR OWN ALCOHOLIC DRINK INTO A DORA CUP AND CARRY IT? No. Beverages must be purchased from participating establishments. No cans, glass bottles, or outside alcoholic beverages will be allowed within the DORA boundaries. Further, alcoholic beverages may not be carried outside of the boundary area.



# **Current Advance Registration Schedule**

Under strict COVID related guidelines from the state, our facility is currently under capacity limitations that require advance registrations. Participants are limited to a 2-hour time slot to visit the facility for their intended activity. Advance registrations must occur in person, over the phone, or online at **www.supersaas.com/schedule/sharonvillerec**. The current schedule of time slots is as follows:

# **Refund Policy**

Membership and class refunds will only be given in cases of medical circumstances (a doctor's note may be required), if the member moves, or if the class is canceled. Refunds are obtained by filling out proper paperwork at the Customer Service Desk. Checks will be sent to your residence within four weeks. If paid by a credit card, refunds will be credited back to the card that was used for the transaction.

# **Community Center Access Policy**

Every person entering the Community Center must stop at the Customer Service Desk to state his/her purpose of coming to the Community Center. If you are a member, please make sure to scan your membership card each time you enter the Community Center and Pools. In order to be as safe as possible and pursuant to City of Sharonville Ordinance Number 2014-13, ALL resident and non-resident guests, ages 18 years and older, purchasing a guest pass\* will be required to provide a valid driver's license or State ID Card. This card will be scanned by the "Safe Point" system against the National Sex Offenders Registry. \*Due to COVID restrictions and capacity limits, guest passes are not currently available.

The entire membership card data base is scanned through the "Safe Point" system twice a year. New members and renewal members joining the Community Center will be scanned before membership cards are given to the members. Should your driver's license or state ID Card match a National or State Sexual Offender Registry record or if you do not provide a valid driver's license or state ID card, you will not be permitted to enter the facility. There is an appeal process.

Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on Recreation property without permit from the Recreation Director. This includes but is not limited to parks, shelters, Community Center, pools, and parking lots.

# **What Our Staff is Doing to Combat COVID**

Our department is currently operating under strict guidelines from the Ohio Department of Health and Governor DeWine. Hand sanitizer is readily available in all areas of the facility. We ask everyone who enters to practice good hygiene and to stay at home if you are not feeling well.


