PARKING VIOLATIONS

One of the more common complaints our department receives is regarding parking issues. Although these types of complaints may seem relatively minor in nature, we understand the frustration that improper and illegal parking can cause to others. Below are some of the more common types of parking violations we receive, such as blocking sidewalks and driveways, maximum consecutive street parking, parking too closely to other parked vehicles, parking near a fire hydrant, and parking on the wrong side of the street.

The following are parking violations as referenced in our Sharonville Codified Ordinance. It is illegal to park a motor vehicle:

- on a sidewalk or on the area between the curb and the sidewalk.
- in front of public or private driveways within a residential district or within three (3) feet of a public or private driveway in areas zoned for business.
- on a street for more than twenty-four (24) consecutive hours.
- within one (1) foot of another parked vehicle.
- within ten (10) feet of a fire hydrant.
- at any place where signs prohibit such as no stopping or parking, or at any place where the curb has been painted yellow.



Upon receiving such complaints, our officers generally strive to contact the owner of the improperly parked vehicle and simply educate them on the law and have them move their vehicle. If the behavior continues or repeated complaints are received that can be verified, the outcome may rise to the level of a citation being issued. Issuing citations to our residents for parking violations is not our preferred course of action but is sometimes necessary. Please help not only us, but your neighbors and fellow residents and be mindful of how and where your vehicles are being parked.

DISPOSING OF MEDICATIONS

There is a drug take-back box in our police lobby at 3639 E Kemper Road, 24/7 all year long!

We ONLY accept pills - no needles or liquids. Place all of the pills into a sealed plastic bag. Mixing different pills together is fine. There is usually a stock of plastic bags in our lobby with the box. Properly disposing of unused medications helps to keep the community safe!

TIPS TO CONSIDER WHEN DIALING 9-1-1

Recently a Sharonville first grader was recognized by Hamilton County Communications Center as a 911 Kid Hero. Not only did she know when to call 911, but was also recognized for how brave and calm she was during and after the call. Additionally, one of Sharonville Police Department's most recent graduates of their Citizen's Academy mentioned he had learned helpful tips from the class for when he had to call 911. Here are tips to consider when dialing 911:

- Location, location know the address needing assistance and if you don't know, let the call taker know.
- What is happening right now? Describe the situation so it can quickly be determined what services (police, fire, EMS, or if all) are needed.
- Is there an immediate danger? Do you see any weapons? Are you in a safe place? Is anyone injured?
- Name and phone number of caller If the caller is leaving the scene or passing by, please provide accurate information and not guesses or assumptions.
- Details, details suspect descriptions, vehicle descriptions, and/or direction of travel for vehicle or persons involved if you see them leave the scene.
- Stay calm and be assured that help is dispatched to you as soon as we have a location and some sort of idea of what is happening.
- Keep in mind that when you call 911, the voice you hear is there to help you by asking all the questions and providing instructions on what to do while waiting for help to arrive. Answer the questions and stay on the line unless instructed to hang up.
- Go outside and greet first responders.

Specific to Fires:

- Call from outside.
- Have a meeting place out front agreed upon in advance for everyone to meet, i.e. mailbox, tree, sidewalk.
- Never go back in. Leave it to firefighters upon their arrival. We will need a quick description as soon as we dismount the truck of any location of possible victims still trapped.

Other information to consider:

- 9-1-1 call takers and emergency dispatchers (i.e. communications officers or emergency telecommunicators) are the first response to your emergency, but do not work for or at the police or fire stations (this applies to Hamilton County).
- At the HCCC, there are individuals that answer the calls, enter the information, and send that to the dispatchers sitting in the same room. The dispatchers communicate with the first responders in the field about the incident.

What is 9-8-8?

Remember some time ago when we were told we needed to start using our 513 area code when making local calls? That was to make way for the new national 988 number, the suicide and crisis lifeline.

The 988 Lifeline provides 24/7, free and confidential support for people in distress, prevention and crisis resources for you or your loved ones, and best practices for professionals in the United States.

You can call, text, or use their website to start a chat. And it's not just for people in crisis; it's also there for you to support others. The website contains a lot of great information and resources at https://988lifeline.org/.

SNOW REMOVAL PROCESS

- PLOWING: All major thoroughfares are plowed and treated first for emergency service vehicles so they can safely reach residences. Residential streets are secondary. If the major roadways are not passable, emergency services cannot reach any resident.
- CUL-DE-SACS: Please be patient. Large snow removal equipment
 often makes the full clearing of some of these areas impossible
 because of limited maneuvering ability. Alternate equipment may
 then be applied when storm conditions have subsided. Remove
 any portable basketball goals from the roadside, as this makes it
 very difficult for snowplows to maneuver around.
- SNOW EMERGENCY: When a SNOW EMERGENCY is declared, all
 vehicles on a street must be removed. Vehicles left unattended
 on a City street during a SNOW EMERGENCY will be removed by
 any reasonable means, including towing. Such expenses will be
 charged to the owner or person in control of such vehicle. The
 media (T.V., radio, as well as social medias) will announce the
 information when a SNOW EMERGENCY has been declared and
 when it has been lifted.



- PARKING: When snow is predicted, please park your car off the street whenever possible. Streets then can be plowed and treated much more effectively. When cars are parked on the street, it is impossible to plow more than one lane. This also reduces the amount of driveway you may have to shove!

Snow Shoveling Guidelines

- Do not shovel snow into the street.
- It is recommended to NOT shovel your entire driveway before a snow plow reaches your street as snow plows are on fixed angles. The ability to change direction is very limited. The City is not responsible for snow that is plowed from the street and re-deposited in private driveways. Plow operators have very few choices as to where the snow can go.
- Older residents & those with health problems are reminded to avoid the extreme physical activity associated with shoveling snow.
- If there's a fire hydrant outside your home or place of business, please consider maintaining it in the event of snowfall. A clear, 3-foot path on all sides makes hydrants easier to locate and can save precious time in an emergency.

A smart way to shovel your drive

How to reduce the possibility of getting a huge pile of snow in your driveway opening when snowplows clear your street:



Personal Safety

- Stay at least two car lengths behind a snow plow for every 10 mph you are traveling. Never cut in between a caravan of plows clearing a road or pass on the right.
- Beware of "black ice," roads that look wet but actually are glazed with ice. Ramps and bridges freeze first.
- Notify us of any potholes, curb, street, sidewalk or storm drainage problems in the City by using the City's website and visiting the Public Works page or calling the Public Works Department.



Trash Collection Reminders

Disposal of refrigerators, freezers and other appliances that contain chlorofluorocarbon (CFC) refrigerants must have the CFC removed from the appliance by a Certified Technician and have documentation attached to the appliance verifying that the CFC has been safely removed. You must fill out paperwork at https://www.rumpke.com/docs/ default-document-library/freon-refrigerant_form.pd and attach it to the appliance. Once you notify Rumpke of the pick-up, they will pick up the appliance on your normal trash pick up day.

Cloth couches and chairs, mattresses and box springs can be placed at the curb with normal trash pickup. These items MUST be wrapped in plastic and sealed tight with tape. Please call RUMPKE at 513-851-0122 a day in advance to notify them of a large item pickup.

Computers, fluorescent bulbs and hazardous waste cannot be placed at the curb for Rumpke trash collection. The Hamilton County and Butler County Recycling and Solid Waste Districts can help you with disposal of electronic and hazardous waste items for homeowners ONLY. Fluorescent bulbs can be taken to hardware stores (Home Depot, Lowes, and Menards) for proper disposal.

SHARONVILLE'S HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The City of Sharonville has partnered with People Working Cooperatively (PWC) to implement the Home Improvement Program for exterior home repairs.

About PWC

PWC is a unique, non-profit organization serving low-income, elderly, and disabled homeowners. PWC has over 44 years of construction experience and provides over 9,000 services every year throughout the Greater Cincinnati area.

General Program Guidelines:

- Must be a <u>resident homeowner</u> of the City of Sharonville
- Resident homeowner must meet income guidelines (see chart right)
- Owner occupied structure
- Structure must be primary residence
- City grant limited to \$2,500 unless City allows an exception
- City funding is limited to exterior repairs only (see below)



Examples of Exterior Repair Services

The repairs include but are not limited to exterior walls (repair of holes, breaks, loose or rotting materials and maintained weatherproofing including painting), roofs and roof drainage (gutters and downspouts), roof flashing, roof overhang extensions, walking surfaces of stairways, porches, decks, (all of which provide principle access to the dwelling unit), handrails, ADA ramps, exterior doors, door frames, windows, and window frames.

TIPS FOR STORING FIREWOOD

- Wood larger than five inches in diameter should be split or recut. This promotes drying and will burn more efficiently. Additionally, this discourages wood-boring insect infestations.
- Appropriately stacked wood will be less prone to infestations by insects or rodents. Avoid straight, vertical rows. Similar to stacking bricks, overlapping each row will add stability. Stack loosely to allow air to circulate.
- Avoid direct contact with soil / ground. Raising stacks at least a few inches off the ground enables air flow and prevents decay. This can be obtained by purchasing a log rack or making one.
- Cover stacked wood with tarp or plastic sheeting, blanketing the top of the pile. The covering should come down a few inches on all sides to keep it mostly exposed to air. Should the pile be completely covered, it will retain moisture which will be absorbed by the wood. The goal is to keep the wood dry.
- Stored / stacked wood should NOT be stored directly against home, garage, or shed. This is not only a fire hazard, but also invites insects, rodents, or snakes living in wood pile to come into your home. If stacking near fence or wall, allow 8-12 inches minimal for air flow. Additionally, it is not recommended to store large amounts of firewood inside your home.
- Never stack higher than four feet in height for safety and stability. If you have a smaller yard,
 placement of firewood may be limited. However, it is safer to remove risk from play areas or dog
 runs.
- During warmer weather, it is best to keep your firewood storage area clean. Overgrowth of grass
 or weeds reduces air circulation and may provide coverage for unwanted critters who will be more
 inclined to use area as a home or hiding spot. Lastly, this overgrowth will take away from your
 yard's overall visual appeal, making it look unsightly and / or unkempt.



ENERGY AGGREGATION UPDATE

Electric: The next City of Sharonville Electric Aggregation program begins in January 2024 and continues through May 2025. The supplier is IGS Energy and the fixed rate for the term is \$0.0657 per kWh. Opt-out letters outlining the offer were mailed to eligible residents and small businesses in early November. If you did not receive a letter, but would like to join the program, contact IGS Energy at 1-877-353-0162 from 8am-8pm EST and ask specifically to join the City of Sharonville Electric Aggregation program.

Reasons for not receiving the mailing include:

- You are not located within City of Sharonville boundaries
- You are already under contract with another electric supplier, in which case, review the terms & conditions of that contract closely as your ability to terminate early with that supplier may be restricted or penalized. If not, ask that your account be returned to the utility at your next meter read and contact IGS.
- You are a business customer using more than 700,000 kWh on an account or are considered a national account by the utility
- You are a PIPP (Percentage of Income Payment) customer
- You are in arrears with the utility

Once enrolled in the program, you will begin receiving the \$0.0657 IGS Energy kWh price within 1-2 billing cycles. As always, participation is voluntary and you may leave the program at any time without penalty or cancellation fees by informing IGS Energy.

Natural Gas: Our current program continues through June 2024 at a fixed rate of \$0.524 per ccf with IGS Energy. The rate and IGS logo will appear in the Billing Section for your natural gas if you are a member. If you are interested in entering the program, contact IGS Energy at 1-877-353-0162 and ask to join the City of Sharonville Natural Gas Aggregation program. If you are already with another supplier, carefully review the terms & conditions of that contact as your ability to terminate early may be restricted or penalized.

Filing Due Dates for 2023

Payment of Estimate Taxes: 2023 estimate tax payments are due by January 16, 2024 if you expect to owe \$200 or more. Failure to pay by this date may result in a penalty.

Individual Returns: On or before April 15, 2024.

Net Profit Business Returns: On or before April 15, 2024 or the 15th day of the 4th month following the end of the fiscal year. If a business has a federal extension their due date for municipalities is now eleven months after the business' year

Withholding Reconciliations: On or before February 29, 2024.

Do I NEED TO FILE A TAX RETURN?

The answer is yes if any of the following apply:

- You are a resident of Sharonville 18 years old or older, regardless of your income level.
- You are under 18 years old and have earned income.
- You are a non-resident who works within the City of Sharonville and your income is not fully withheld by an employer.
- You are engaged in a business within the City of Sharonville and have sales, perform services or own rental property, whether or not tax is due.
- Your business is located within or doing business within the City of Sharonville.

We recommend you file early, as the number of people seeking assistance increases dramatically as the tax filing deadline approaches. A secure drop box located next to the front door of our office is also available 24/7 for your convenience.

WHAT DO I NEED TO BRING WITH ME OR SEND IN WITH MY SHARONVILLE TAX RETURN?

- W-2 form(s) 1.
- Federal 1040 tax return including:
- Schedule 1, C, E, F and/or 4797 if applicable
- Documentation for any income reported on your Federal tax form as "other income"
- Any other federal schedules or forms which document deductions or additions to your local tax return
- Copies of other local tax returns or refund requests you've filed

How Do I Pay My Tax?

- Check or money order payments may be mailed in and should be made payable to "City of Sharonville Tax".
- Payments by check, money order, cash, or credit card are accepted at the tax office. A fee is charged by the processing company for debit or credit card payments.
- Payments may also be made through ACI Payments either online at www.CityofSharonville.com or by phone at 1-800-487-4567.
 ACI Payments charges a nominal fee for this service which may be calculated using the fee calculator available.
- If your balance has been sent to the Ohio Attorney General, all payments must be paid directly to them at P.O. Box 89471, Cleveland OH, 44101. If you have questions, contact them at 1-888-871-8838 or visit their web site at www. ohioattorneygeneral.gov.

WHAT INCOME IS TAXABLE?

- Qualifying wages are defined by the IRS tax code section 3121(a). It includes many different types of income, including but not limited to wages, sick pay, vacation pay, commissions, severance pay, settlements, bonuses, fringe benefits, short-term disability pay, stock options and deferred compensation. It is usually found in Box 5 (Medicare wages) on your W-2, however there are some exceptions.
- Other income (generally listed on line 8 of your Federal 1040 Schedule 1) such as gambling winnings, HSA and scholarship distributions, director's fees, jury duty income and prize winnings.
- The net of all profit and losses from profession and/or business operations.

WHAT INCOME IS EXEMPT FROM TAX?

- Interest, dividends, some royalties
- Capital gains (unless considered ordinary income)
- Alimony
- Military pay and allowances
- Proceeds from qualified IRS defined retirement plans
- Social Security benefits, welfare benefits, unemployment insurance benefits, workers' compensation

This information regarding income is not all encompassing. Please contact our office if you have questions regarding the taxability of specific types of income.

WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY ESTIMATE PAYMENTS?

All federal, state, and local taxes are due during the year that income is earned. Most companies withhold federal and state taxes from your paychecks, but they may not withhold local income taxes, or may withhold less tax than our 1.5% rate. If a taxpayer reasonably expects to owe \$200 or more due to not having at least 1.5% local tax withheld they need to make estimate payments or may be charged penalties.

If you owe less than \$200, but still wish to make estimated payments please note this on your tax return.

Second quarter estimate payments for 2023 are due by June 17, 2024. For your convenience a coupon will be sent with your 2023 tax return. Invoices will be sent for the 3rd and 4th quarter payments which are due on September 16, 2024, and January 15, 2025.

Why Do I Have to Include My Federal 1040 Form?

All cities in the State of Ohio require a copy of your federal 1040 form to be included with your local tax return. This helps us assure we have all the necessary paperwork and are taxing & giving credits for the correct amounts.

Do I GET CREDIT FOR PAYING OTHER CITIES?

Yes, credit for taxes withheld or paid to another municipality is available to residents. It is limited to 1.5% of the amount of W-2 wages taxed to another municipality, and no amounts exceeding the 1.5% limit will be credited toward additional taxable income. Credits for taxes paid for business income are also limited to 1.5% and are prorated based on percentage of total business income. Documentation is required for any credit. There are no credits given for county, mental health, or school taxes paid.



NET OPERATING LOSSES FOR 2023 TAX RETURNS

Businesses, including individuals filing Schedules C, E, and/or F, may use 100% of any losses carried forward from 2018 through 2022 on their 2023 tax return.

How Can I GET AN EXTENSION?

If you have received a federal extension to file, you automatically can have an extension with the City of Sharonville until October 15, 2024. A copy of the extension must accompany the filed tax return to avoid penalties. If you do not apply for a federal extension you may request an extension in writing with our office by April 15, 2024. Please remember that an extension to file does not give you an extension to pay your taxes, so be sure to make all payments by April 15th.

PROPERTY TAXES

The collections of property taxes (whether it is for residential property or business property) are the responsibility of Hamilton County or Butler County. *The City of Sharonville does not receive property tax dollars from city residents or businesses and is proud that a municipal property tax has not been levied in over 30 years.* For further information on the collection and payment of property taxes, please contact either the Hamilton County Auditor's office at (513) 946-4000 or the Butler County Auditor's office at (513) 887-3154.

SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX

The City of Sharonville is within the Princeton City School District. The code for state income tax form purposes is 3116.

Community Center Access Policy

Every person entering the Community Center must stop at the Customer Service Desk to state his/her purpose of coming to the Community Center. If you are a member, please make sure to scan your membership card each time you enter the Community Center and Pool. In order to be as safe as possible and pursuant to City of Sharonville Ordinance Number 2014-13, ALL resident and non-resident guests, ages 18 years and older, purchasing a guest pass will be required to provide a valid driver's license or state ID card. This card will be scanned by the "Safe Point" System against the National Sex Offenders Registry.

The entire membership card data base is scanned through the "Safe Point" system twice a year. New members and renewal members joining the Community Center will be scanned before membership cards are given to the members. Should your driver's license or state ID card match a National or State Sexual Offender Registry record or if you do not provide a valid driver's license or state ID card, you will not be permitted to enter the facility. There is an appeal process.

Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on Recreation property without permit from the Recreation Director. This includes but is not limited to parks, shelters, Community Center, pools, and parking lots.



Guest Policy *Guest Fee is \$5 per Person

Our goal in this policy is to accommodate our members as best as we can, without creating a potentially unsafe or unfair usage of the facility.

- Members age 10 & over may enter the Community Center by themselves. Members under the age of 10 must be accompanied by an adult, age 18+.
- The fee for a member to bring a quest is \$5.00 per person. Guests ages 2 & under are not subject to a fee.
- Members ages 10 to 17 are permitted to bring no more than 2 guests per day.
- Adult members over the age of 18 are permitted to bring up to 5 guests per day. If the guests are from the same family as the member, they are permitted to bring more than 5.
- Example: An adult member over the age of 18 is bringing their adult daughter, son in law, and five granchildren from out of town to visit the pool. Since all guests are from the same family as the member, this would be permitted.
- All guests over the age of 18 are required to provide a valid driver's license or state ID to be scanned by our SafePoint system against the National Sex Offenders Registry.
- Members are responsible for the behavior of their quests while they are in our facility. The Recreation Department reserves the right to ban future entry.
- All guests are required to complete the guest sign in sheet when entering the Community Center.
- Guests are required to leave the facility with the member once they have completed their activity.
- Discounted guest pass bundles can be purchased at the Community Center front desk only. Purchase 5 guest passes in advance for only \$20.00 and 10 in advance for only \$35.00.

Refund Policy

Membership and class refunds will only be given in cases of medical circumstances (a doctor's note may be required), if the member moves, or if the class is canceled. Refunds are obtained by filling out proper paperwork at the Customer Service Desk. Checks will be sent to your residence within four weeks. If paid by a credit card, refunds will be credited back to the card that was used for the transaction.


